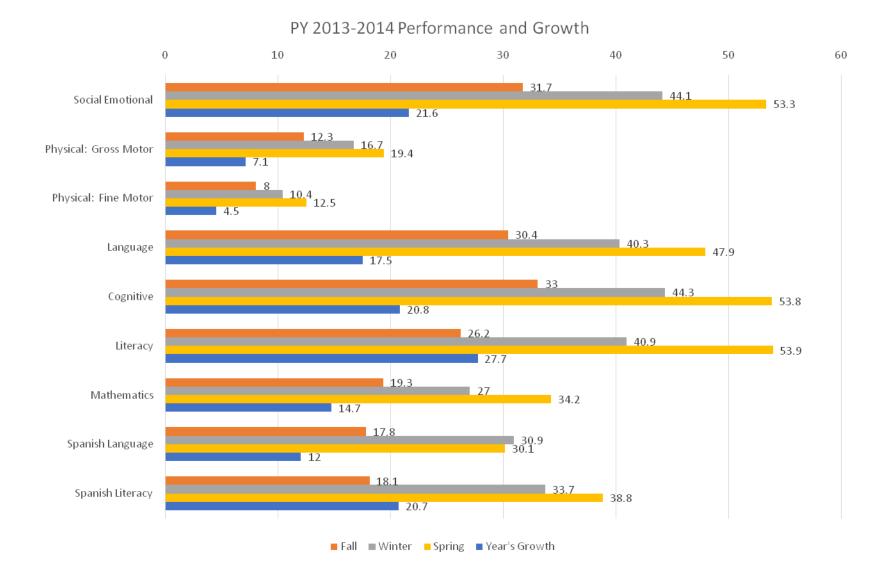

The following report is generated from the analysis of program data that reflects progress over time in various categories during the school year and represents answers to questions asked during our data collection process.

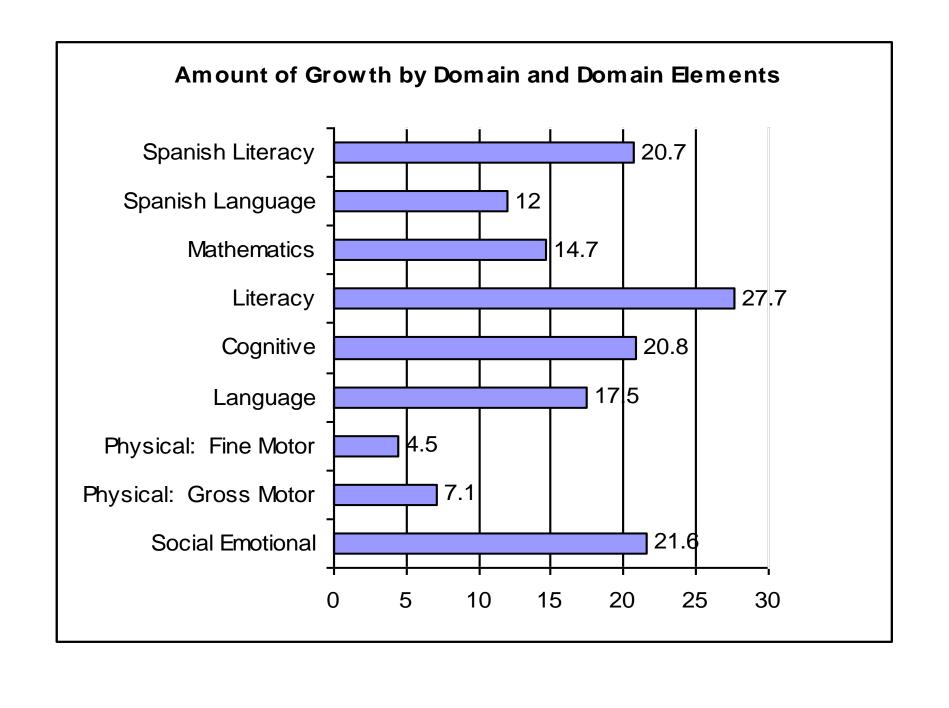

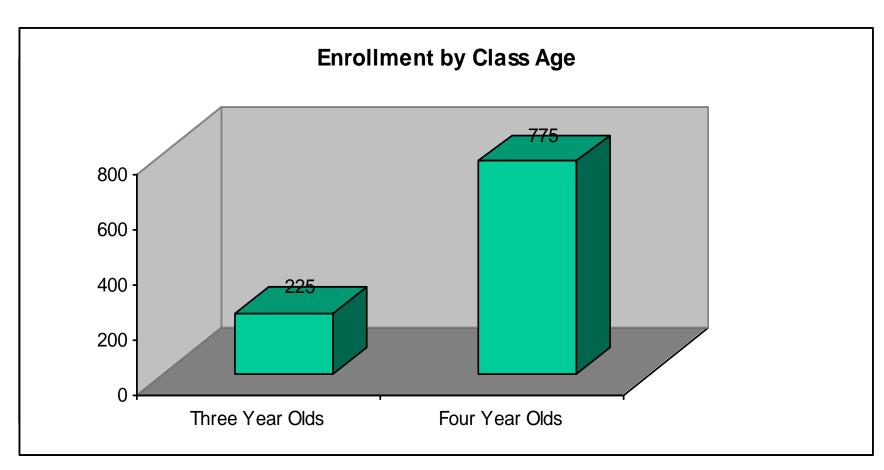

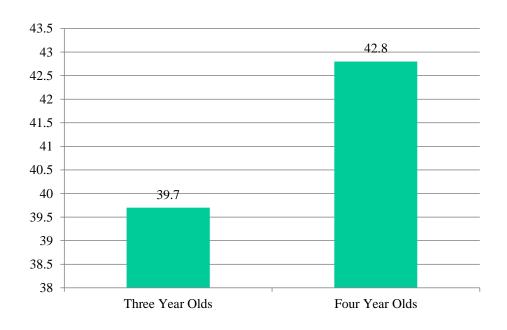
PY 2013-2014 Performance and Growth Child Outcomes

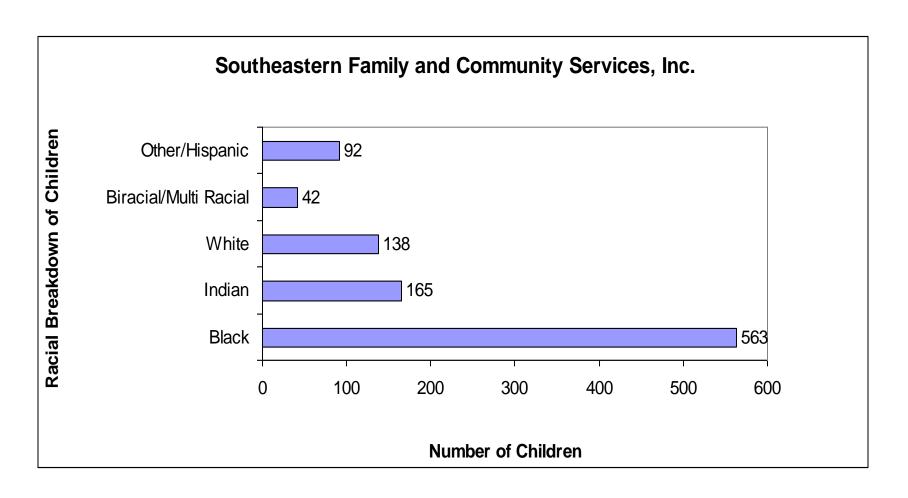

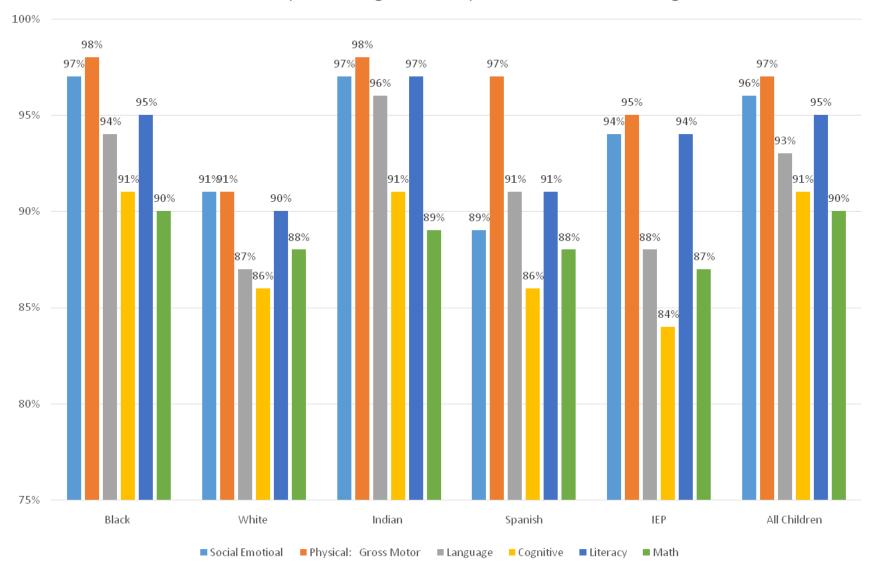

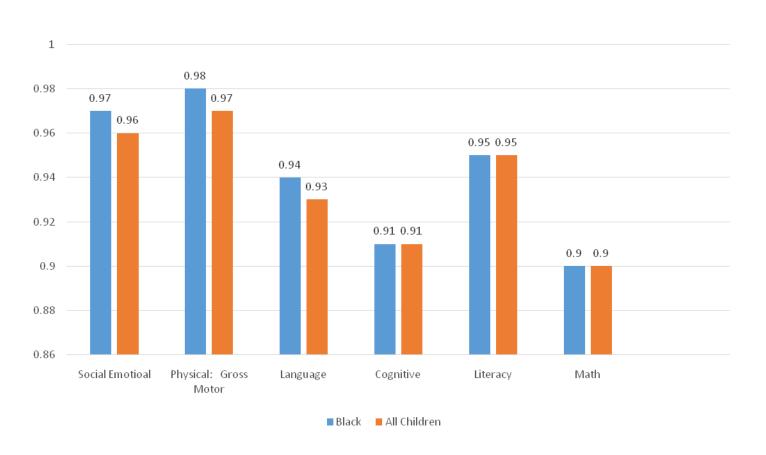
Racial Breakdown of Children Served



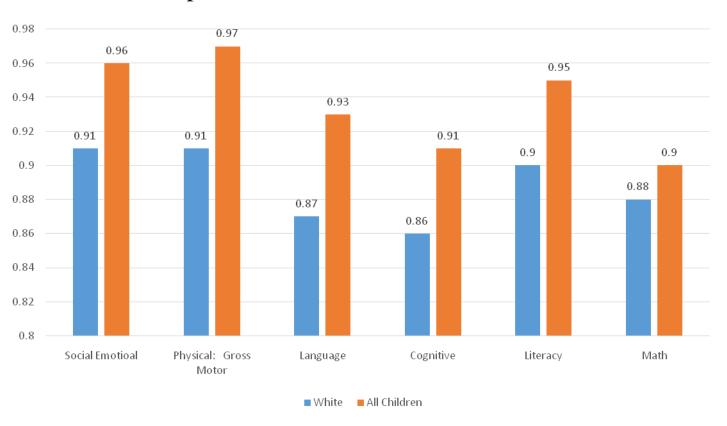
How Racial Groups are Doing when Compared to all Children in Program



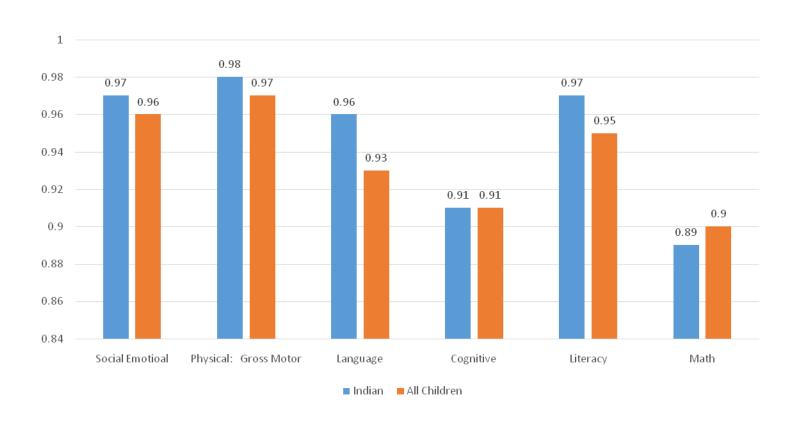
Comparison of Black Children to all Children



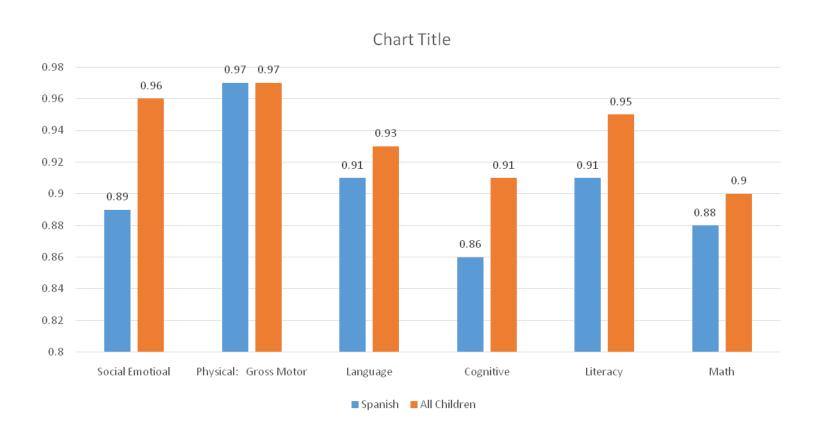
Comparison of White Children to all Children

Summary of Data Analysis

- Our children are making continuous progress
- Our greatest strength is in Literacy
- Our greatest need is in Fine Motor Development
- The four year olds are progressing at a greater rate than our three year olds, however; both groups are meeting expectations
- Groups of children are making continuous progress
- There is a need to improve in Spanish Language
- The health needs of our children are being taken care of with no health problems having major impacts on educational development
- Children with special needs are making progress within the general range of the other children
- Staff have the educational levels needed to develop and carry out successful learning strategies in the classroom/learning environment
- Families are being supported in meeting their needs and are engaged in center and community activities
- Dental health is being addressed and continuous care is being provided

Summary of Data Analysis Continued

- Attendance did not impact development and learning
- All centers have shown continuous progress
- To support professional development a Mentor Coaching program has been started
- To support staff-child interactions, CLASS observations are implemented and scores are within the range for non-re-competition
- Classrooms that use Mentor Coaches have improved outcomes in all domains of learning
- Children with disabilities are being supported in their learning and development through implementation of their IEP or IFS
- Centers are able to look at individual needs when providing instruction and improving instruction for children as a group and individually
